Progress Update

Consultant Preparing Long-Term Strategic Vision for Graduating Civil Society from CEPF Support in the Albertine Rift and the Eastern Arc Mountains

Donor Council is asked to review the approach for building the long-term vision for the Eastern Afromontane as the first example of its kind implementing the Phase III Strategy.

Background

As part of implementing the CEPF Strategy for Phase III, and an input to the Project Preparation Grant for the GEF bridge grant that CEPF received in 2014, CEPF identified the Eastern Afromontane and the Indo-Burma biodiversity hotspots as the first locations to develop a long-term strategic vision for graduating civil society from CEPF support. CEPF developed detailed terms of reference, with specific deliverables, to define the shape of such long-term visions. The terms of reference specify the following tasks:

- 1. Establishment of a senior advisory group.
- 2. Review of literature, government and donor strategies.
- 3. Consultation with a diversity of stakeholders.
- 4. Determination of "graduation" criteria.
- 5. Determination of targets and milestone.
- 6. Prioritization of actions.
- 7. Development of a financing plan to implement the long-term vision.

The terms of reference specify the following deliverables:

 15-page background chapter with socioeconomic context, state of civil society, review of conservation financing mechanisms, review of policies, and review of private sector in the hotspot.

- 2. A table with the long-term vision criteria and targets across five parameters.
- 3. A table with a baseline for graduation over five-year periods starting in 2016, 2021 and 2026.
- 4. A table identifying actions to be taken by CEPF.
- 5. A 5-page financing plan.
- 6. A 5-page theory of change linking CEPF actions to graduation targets.

The terms of reference are ambitious and broad, even more so for a multi-country hotspot. Thus, for the Eastern Afromontane, CEPF decided to make the scope marginally smaller by focusing only on the Albertine Rift and Eastern Arc Mountains, consisting of the Nile Basin/Albertine Rift lakes (Kivu, Edward, Albert), Lake Tanganyika and Lake Victoria. This includes parts of South Sudan, Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Kenya and Tanzania, per the figure attached. "Completing" the long-term vision exercise in the Eastern Afromontane region will necessitate a separate exercise for the montane "islands" to the south (i.e., Malawi, Zambia, Zimbabwe and Mozambique), a different effort for Ethiopia, and possibly other efforts for Yemen and Eritrea. As is perhaps evident, the challenge is consideration of a very different "civil society" in each of these countries.

CEPF determined that the most efficient way to complete the exercise in the Albertine Rift and Eastern Arc Mountains would be to engage an independent consultant or firm working with the logistical support of the EAM Regional Implementation Team, BirdLife International and IUCN, based in Nairobi, Kenya.

In September 2014, CEPF opened a competitive procurement process, and in November, awarded a contract of \$49,926 to Future Dialogues International (FDI) of Kampala, Uganda, headed by Alex Muhweezi. The contract runs through April 2015.

Progress to Date

Alex Muhweezi mobilized in November 2014 and traveled to Nairobi to ensure close collaboration with the RIT for the Eastern Afromontane Hotspot. He then established a Planning and Advisory Group (PAG), consisting of:
